 - C. The bins are transported to one of the company's recycling facilities and are sorted by product (e.g. shampoo, shower gel).
 - D. The toiletries are entered into a tracking system for inventory purposes.
 - E. For bar soap, it is surface cleaned and then sterilized.

8. Read the text about an imaginary eco-hotel. Then, discuss the questions.

Welcome to the world's most sustainable hotel. We hope you're ready for a truly unique experience in our sustainability heaven! Before you arrive, we think you should know a few things. Firstly, our hotel does not permit the use of air-conditioning or central heating if the air temperature outside is similar to room temperature. But we do provide resources like blankets or handheld fans upon your request. We also have a strict 'one-wash-a-week policy' for bed sheets and towels. If you need these items washed more than once a week, you need to pay an additional fee. We are also serious about preventing water waste, so we have a ten-minute limit on all guests' showers. And we implement non-flushable 'compost toilets', which generate organic material for the plant life in our gardens. Speaking of plants, you should also know that the hotel's restaurant is 100% vegan. Also, if you're feeling active, we encourage you to head to the Garden Gym, where you can exercise on our specialized machines and generate electricity to power the hotel at the same time! Lastly, we'd like to remind you that every guest receives a Transparency Report at the end of their stay, detailing their energy use and carbon footprint from their stay.
